

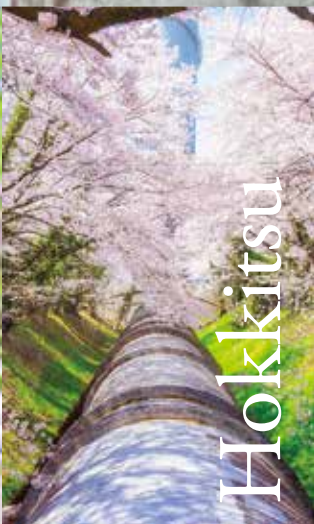

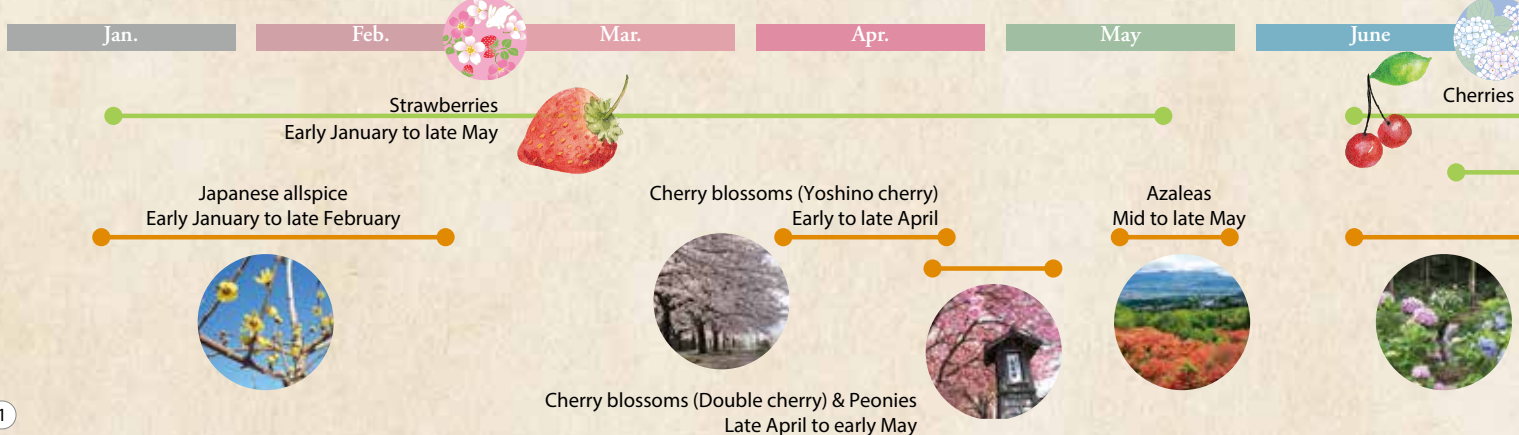
## Shibukawa, central of the Japanese archipelago

Shibukawa, Gunma Prefecture, is at a central point of the Japanese archipelago, earning it the title of Bellybutton of Japan.

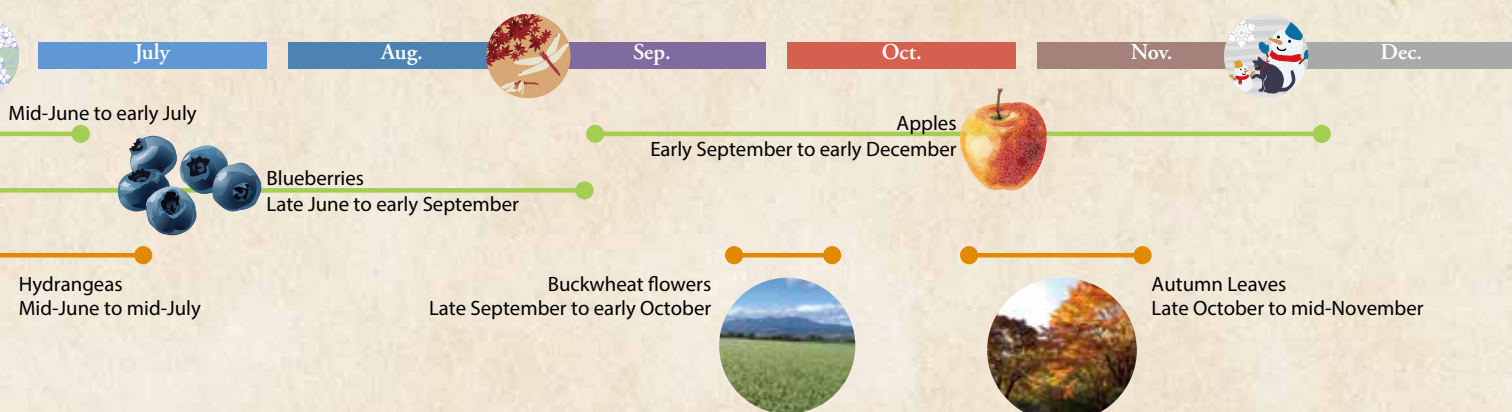
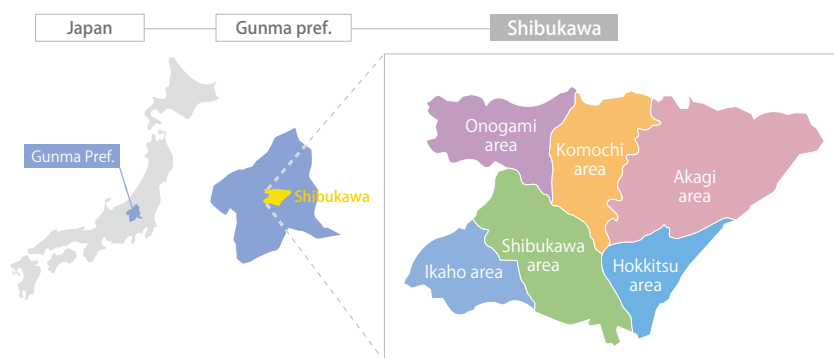

# IKAHO



## Ikaho Ishidan (Stone Steps)

Ikaho's famous Ishidan-gai (Stone Steps) is one of Japan's three famous staircases, alongside the Yamadera in Yamagata and Konpira-san in Kagawa. Built approximately 440 years ago based on Japan's first hot spring city plan, the town retains its historic charm. On either side of the street are ryokans, souvenir shops, and shooting galleries, making the main street of this charming hot spring town, Ikaho Ishidan-gai, a must-visit destination for any visitor.



## History of Ikaho Onsen

Ikaho Onsen is said to have been discovered during the reign of the 11th Emperor Suinin about 1,900 years ago due to volcanic activity from Mt. Haruna and Mt. Futatsudake. The town of hot springs in Ikaho began in 1576, when seven clans, including the Kigure clan under the Takeda clan, utilized the sloping terrain to create a bustling hot springs town.

Over time, they relocated the hot spring source to its current location, then implemented Japan's first hot-spring resort city plan, featuring stone steps and a system for drawing and distributing the hot springs to designated residences. This rich history has continued to the present day.



## Komaguchi

In the past, Ikaho Onsen had a unique hierarchical system with seven clans that formed the hot spring resort town, serving as landlords and holding ownership of the hot springs. During the Edo period, these landlords were divided into fourteen clans, with each group allocated a portion of the hot springs.

The Komaguchi system was developed due to this hierarchical structure and referred to the water intake for the hot springs.

The hot springs flowing from the Yumoto (hot spring source) are distributed among the various ryokans on both sides via the Komaguchi in predetermined amounts. There are 16 Komaguchi, some of which are available for viewing at Ishidan-gai.





# Two sources of springs in Ikaho

There are two types of hot springs in Ikaho: Kogane no yu (Golden Hot Spring) and Shirogane no yu (Silver Hot Spring). Ikaho Onsen, which appears in the Manyoshu, has long been loved for its Kogane no yu, a brownish-brown hot spring with high iron content. Due to its gentle water quality and ability to warm the body from the core, it has beloved by women and is known as a hot spring for promoting fertility. Furthermore, Shirogane no yu, which confirmed springing recently, has abundant hot springs and is known to be beneficial for post-illness recovery, fatigue recovery, and health promotion. Kogane no yu has a spring source outlet right next to the Ikaho Rotenburo, and visitors can observe the powerful sight of the spring water gushing out with a flow rate of 1,400 liters per minute.



**Kogane no yu** (Golden hot spring)

Spring type : Sulfate spring

Efficacy : Cuts, cold sensitivity, peripheral circulatory disturbance, and other.



**Shirogane no yu** (Silver hot spring)

Spring type: Hot spring, according to Metasilicic acid listed in Article 2 of the Hot Spring Act.

Efficacy : Recovery after illness, recovery from fatigue, health enhancement.

## Bathing Manner

Please keep the following manners to enjoy a hot spring bath.

- Tie up long hair with an elastic band or wrap it in a towel.



- Do not bathe wearing clothes or underwear.



- Wash your body before getting into the onsen bathtub.



- Do not soak towels in the onsen bathtub.



- Do not wash your body in the onsen bathtub.



- Do not wash your clothes in the onsen bathtub.

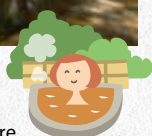


### Ikaho Rotenburo

Ikaho Rotenburo is a public open-air bath located at the source of the Kogane no yu. It has no facilities such as showers but is nestled in nature and makes visitors forget the hustle and bustle of daily life. There is also a drinking hot spring facility nearby.

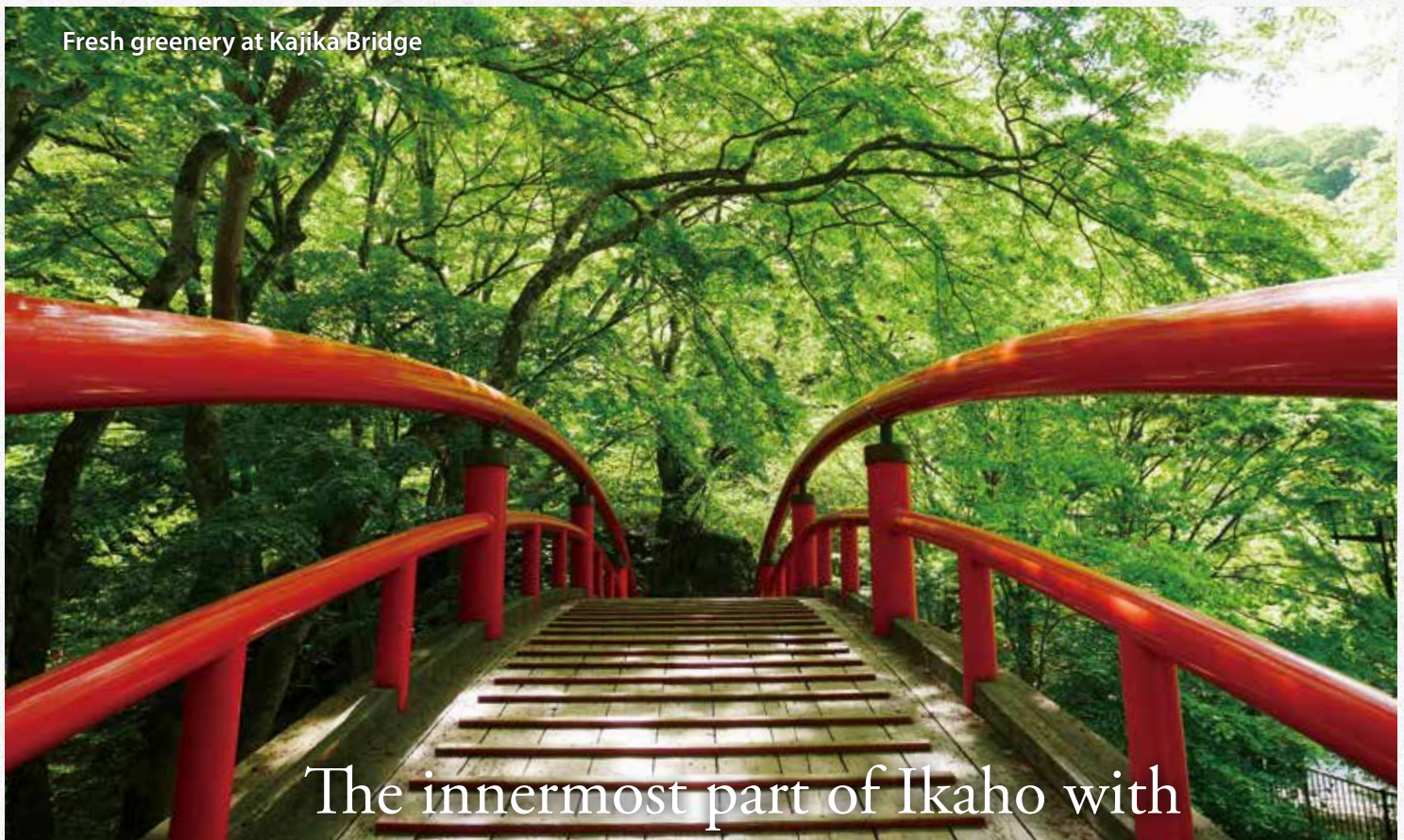

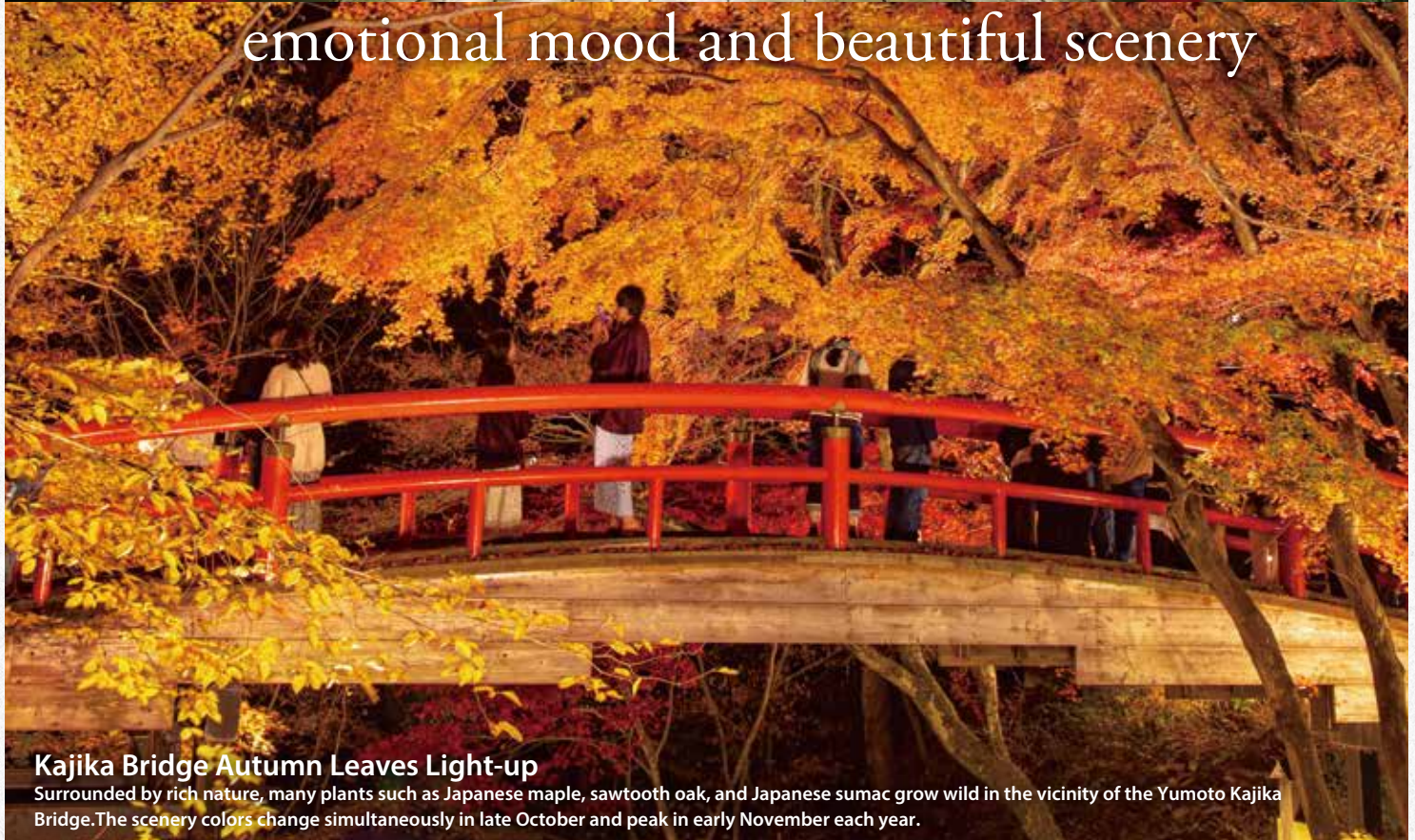

### Kajika Bridge Autumn Leaves Light-up

Surrounded by rich nature, many plants such as Japanese maple, sawtooth oak, and Japanese sumac grow wild in the vicinity of the Yumoto Kajika Bridge. The scenery colors change simultaneously in late October and peak in early November each year.

### Kajika Bridge

Kajika Bridge locates in the innermost part of Ikaho Onsen, adjacent to the hot spring source and the Ikaho Rotenburo.

The vermilion-painted drum bridge is a popular spot for enjoying the fresh greenery in spring, and the autumn leaves in fall and is a must-see when visiting Ikaho.







## Housuiji Temple

Housuiji Temple was built as the main temple of the Rinza Sect of Buddhism in Japan, and its head temple is in Taiwan. It features spacious grounds, and the view from the temple gate is sure to be a picture-perfect sight! The temple also offers free experiences of Zazen meditation and Sutra-copying.

### Mizusawa udon

Ikaho's specialty Mizusawa Udon is considered one of Japan's three major udon noodles, alongside Akita's Inaniwa Udon and Kagawa's Sanuki Udon. It is known for its unique firm texture and semi-transparent appearance. It is said that a Korean monk who made great efforts to establish Mizusawa Kannon Temple taught the udon noodle-making method. Around 1576, it began to be served to hot spring visitors and Mizusawa Kannon Temple pilgrims. Please enjoy the proud taste of Mizusawa Udon at the skilled restaurants lining Mizusawa Udon Street.



### Yunohana Manju

Nowadays, onsen manju (steamed buns filled with sweet beans) has become a popular souvenir from hot spring resorts, and Ikaho is said to be its birthplace. Yunohana Manju is an onsen manju with thin brown skin that imitates the color of Ikaho's Kogane no yu (Golden Hot Spring). It is famous for its soft, chewy skin and the elegant sweetness of its sweet bean filling. The taste and size may vary from shop to shop. Since most shops sell them individually, visitors can enjoy comparing the different manju at each shop. Please be sure to try Ikaho's signature souvenir, Yunohana Manju.

## Onoike Hydrangea Park

Onoike Hydrangea Park locates between Hirasawa River and Ono Pond. Over 8,000 hydrangeas bloom from June to mid-July every year, drawing crowds of visitors.

Shibukawa City, once comprised of six municipalities, merged to form a single city in 2006. Hydrangea petals blooming close to each other perfectly fit the image of the merged and united Shibukawa City; thus, the hydrangea was designated as the city flower.

## Saku Power Station

A giant surge tank, 80 meters high, towers over the hydroelectric power station.

Some 100 cherry trees grow around the water conduit, and the area is bustling with cherry blossom-viewing visitors during the blooming in late March.

Hijiri Sake Brewery, Shibukawa city's only sake brewery, was founded in 1842. Kanto no Hana, locally brewed sake made with water from Mt. Akagi, has won gold medals at numerous sake competitions.

## Tanashita Fudo Waterfall

Tanashita Fudo Waterfall was selected as one of the 100 Best Waterfalls in Japan for its spectacular view down a 37-meter cliff created by lava from Mt. Akagi. Behind the waterfall, the cliff has collapsed to form a cave, allowing visitors to see the waterfall from the back side.



## Akagi Nature Park

Akagi Nature Park is located at an elevation of 600 to 700 meters at the western foot of Mt. Akagi and is a forest overflowing with the beauty of the four seasons throughout the year, from spring flowers in full bloom to winter birds singing everywhere.

The 60-hectare site has been certified as a Forest Therapy Base with scientifically proven healing effects. It is home to numerous wildflowers, insects, wild birds, and small animals such as rabbits and squirrels. With one step into the park, visitors can experience the rich forest that nurtures life. Simple guides are available to show visitors the park's highlights during the day, so even first-time visitors can enjoy the park.

## Kabuki stage of Kami-Miharada

The Kabuki stage of Kami-Miharada, with its unique mechanism unparalleled in Japan, is considered a nationally designated Important Tangible Folk Cultural Property. The stage operation is open to the public and Kabuki performances take place on an occasional basis.



## Ayado-yana

It is a hideaway fish weir on the Tone River with a tradition of three generations since the Taisho Era. From the tatami mat area, visitors can overlook the weir built on the clear stream of the Tone River.

# KOMOCHI

## Mt. Komochi

Mt. Komochi is at the Nasu Volcanic Belt and began volcanic activity in the middle of the fourth century (500,000-600,000 years ago). Since many years have passed since the volcano ceased eruptive activity, it is possible to safely and directly view the inside of volcano, including the volcanic necks and dikes.



## Shiroishuku

Shiroishuku is a famous spot for its Yaezakura cherry blossoms. The Shiroi weir along the center of the street, Tsurube wells, Michishirube (signposts), and Nagayamon (row-house gate) retain vestiges of the town's prosperous days as an inn town.



## Shishiwa (Lion Rock)

Towering over Mt. Komochi is a rock tower that looks like a lion. The scenery is spectacular, with various expressions depending on the angle of view. The top of the rock tower offers a panoramic view of the Kanto Plain.



## Maple Village Komochi

Bungalows in a quiet forest setting are villa-style cottages with showers and kitchens. Indoor barbecue facilities are also available.

## Daiichi Azumagawa Bridge

Onoko-Sanzan is the collective name for Mt. Onoko, Mt. Nakanodake, and Mt. Junigatake, which are representative of Onogami.

# SHRINES AND TEMPLES

Shibukawa, which has flourished as a strategic transportation hub since ancient times, features a variety of Shinto shrines and Buddhist temples. Enjoy a relaxing time experiencing the culture and history of each temple and shrine and admiring the scenery of the four seasons.



## Mizusawa Kannon Temple

Temple 16 of the Bando 33 Kannon Pilgrimage and an old temple of the Tendai Sect of Buddhism. The Main Hall (Kannon Hall), the Rokkakudo (Jizodo), the Shaka Hall, and the bell tower stand side by side in the spacious precincts.

## Ikaho Shrine

Ikaho Shrine is located at the top of Ikaho stone steps, and this historic shrine has long been known as the San-no-Miya Shrine of Kozuke No Kuni.



## Kiso-sanja Shrine

It said that the surviving vassals of Kiso Yoshinaka built this shrine as a deity of Engishiki Sansha (three shrines in Nagano: Okada Shrine, Sada Shrine, and Are Shrine).



## Shinkoji Temple

Shinkoji Temple is one of the five temples of the Tendai Sect of Buddhism in the Kanto region. It is also known as Ajisai-dera (temple of hydrangeas) because of the beautiful hydrangeas on the temple grounds.



## Fukuzoji Temple

Enjoy the seasonal beauty of lit-up cherry blossoms and the various colors of the trees and flowers in the garden.



## Shorenji Temple

Shorenji Temple, a temple of the Shinshu Buddhist Otani-ha Sect, earns the nickname Peony Temple because 1,500 peonies of more than 90 varieties bloom from late April to May each year.



## Komochi Shrine

This shrine is located on the southern foothills of Mt. Komochi and is believed to bring blessings for fertility and safe childbirth. The large Byobu-iwa rock is also a notable feature of the shrine.

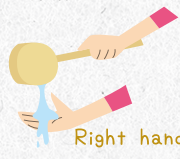
## How to perform Temizu, or hand washing, when praying at Shrines and Temples

Hand washing represents purifying one's body, and mouth rinsing purifies one's mind.

① Scoop water with a ladle and wash your left hand.

② Next, wash your right hand.

③ Then, change the ladle to scoop water into your left hand and rinse your mouth



④ Rewash your left hand.

⑤ Last, tilt the ladle with both hands to wash the handle.



※ Do not put the ladle directly in your mouth.

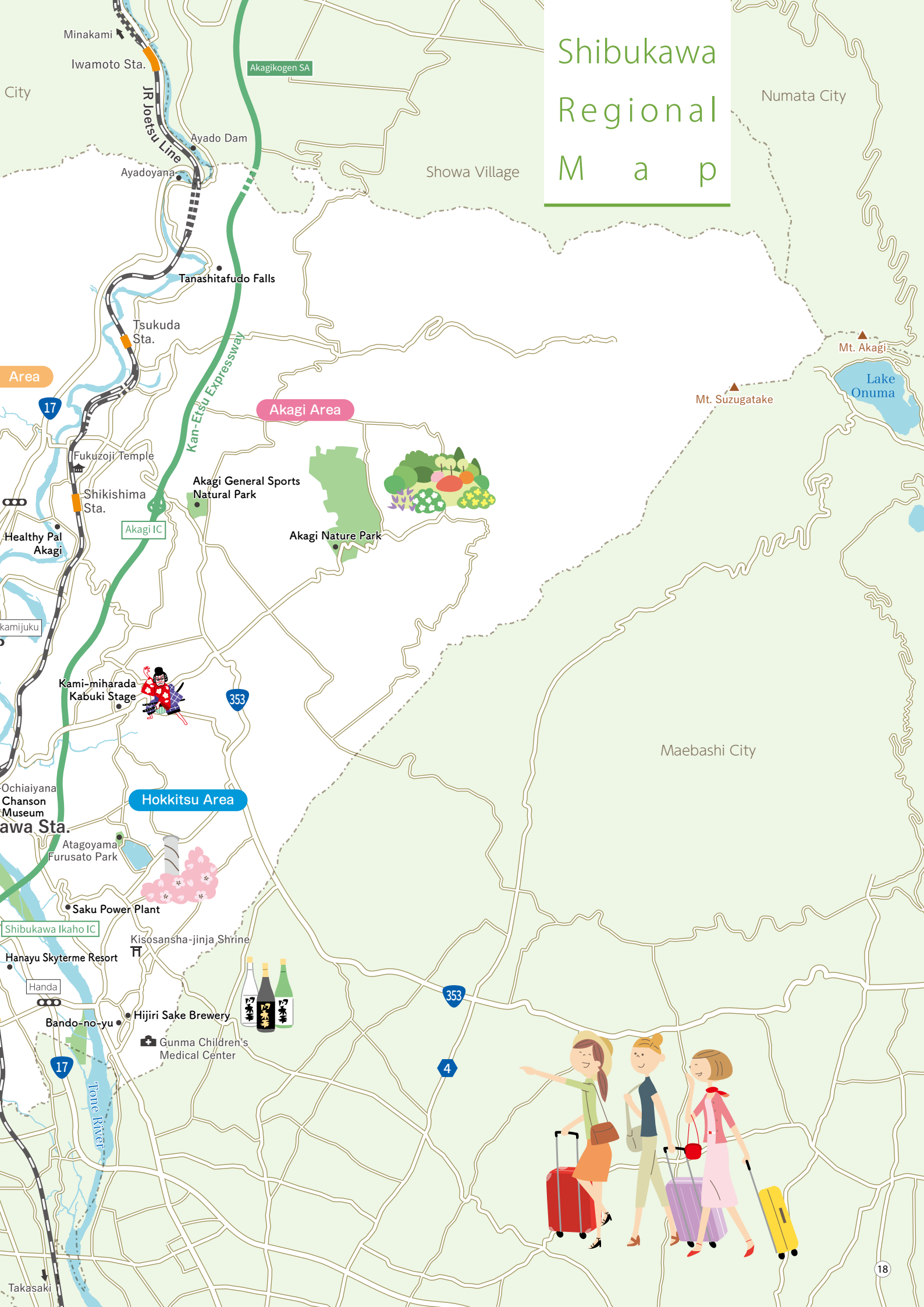

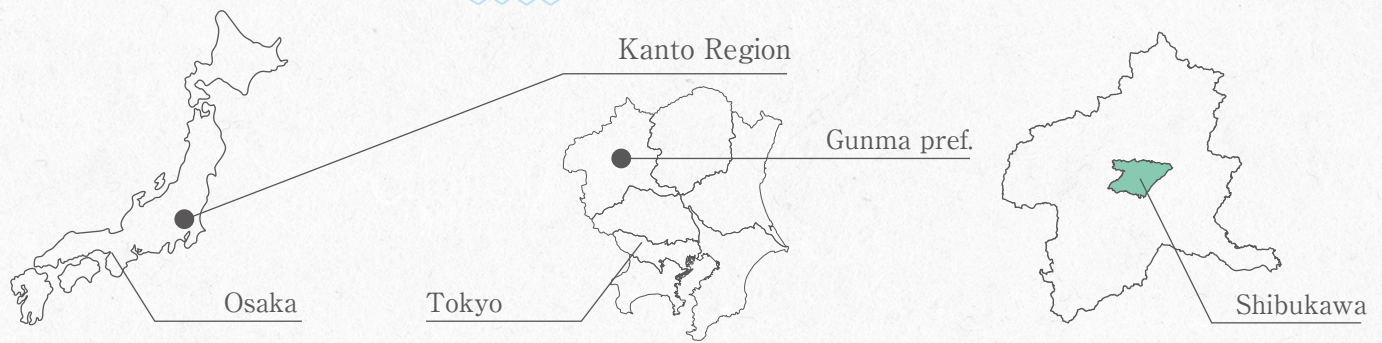


# Shibukawa Regional Map

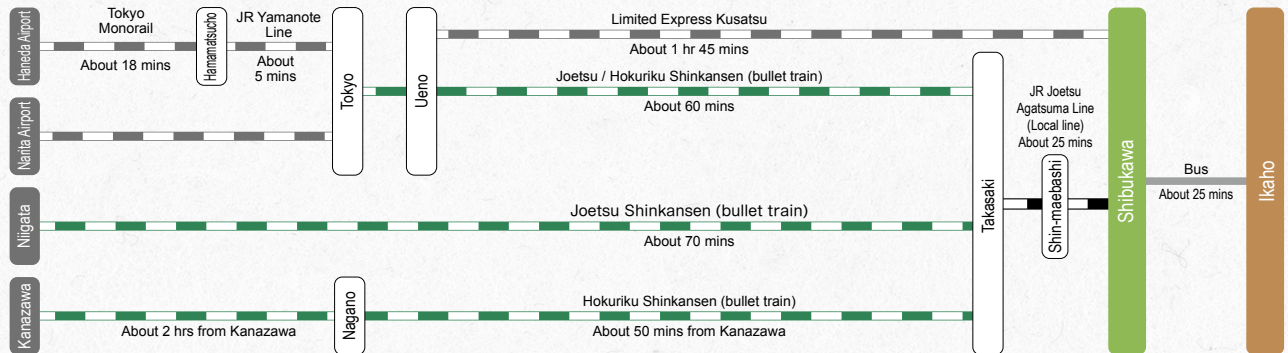




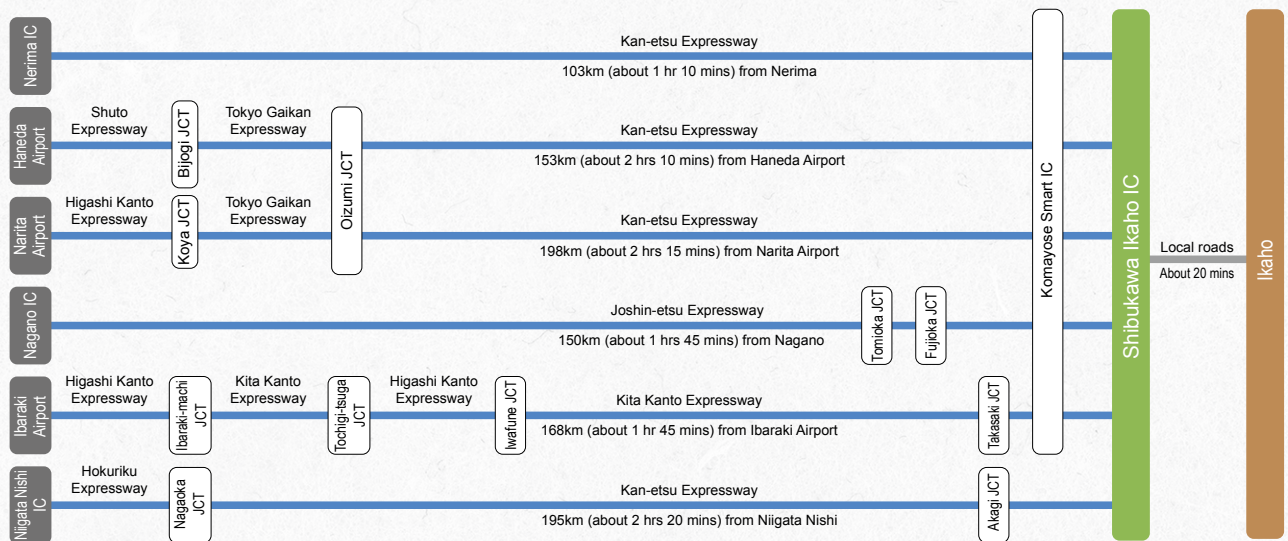
